

BOROUGH OF WYOMISSING – COUNCIL MINUTES

DECEMBER 13, 2022 – 7:00 P.M.

The Borough of Wyomissing Council held their regular meeting in the Borough of Wyomissing Council Chambers on the above date and time. Council President William S. Jenckes called the meeting to order at 7:00 p.m. with the following persons present: Stephen D. Brunner, Frederick R. Mogel, Jana R. Barnett, Ronald C. Stanko, and David L. Reeser; Mayor Frederick C. Levering, Treasurer Gregory L. Portner, Borough Solicitor Christopher Hartman, Borough Manager & Economic Development Coordinator Michele Bare, Fire Chief Colin Hackman, Public Works Director James V. Babb, Recreation Director Pete Beck, and Borough Secretary Melissa Miller. The following persons were absent: Councilmember Keith L. Derr, Borough Engineer James McCarthy, and Police Chief John Phillips.

An executive session was held before the meeting to discuss personnel matters.

PUBLIC COMMENTS (agenda items):

Dr. Eve Kimball, 14 Gaelsong Lane shared with Council that residents have provided much support for continued fluoridation treatments in the Western Berks Water Authority water supply, and further shared important facts about fluoridation, including the fact that the fluoride water treatment is a public health measure to support dental health. She also indicated that when handled properly, fluoride can be safe. Lastly, she found that the Western Berks Water Authority did not apply for any grants to assist with offsetting the costs for fluoridation treatments, and shared that a new round of grants will be opening soon.

Gregory Krutoyarsky, 41 Cardinal Road expressed his concern that the Borough is spending tax money excessively. He provided the example of Borough Ordinances 1403 and 1408 related to

“No Parking” in a designated area in front of 47 Cardinal Road. He indicated that as discussed during a prior Fire and Police committee meeting, a study was completed to determine that it was recommended to not allow parking on a section of Cardinal Road due to the limited ability to maneuver emergency apparatus. He was concerned that thousands of dollars were spent on gathering information, generating, and adopting the Ordinances. Mr. Krutoyarsky indicated he too requested the same protection and did not get it. He noted that despite the Ordinance being passed, vehicles belonging to, or visiting 47 Cardinal are parked within the “No Parking” zone. He further expressed his opinion of the Police Department and Borough government being corrupt. Lastly, he was concerned that votes may be made before the public vote takes place, and also noted that executive sessions are possibly not being held for the reasons as permitted by the Sunshine Act. Later in the meeting Mr. Krutoyarsky objected to the Sunshine Act, indicating he wanted to see the public comment session for the Fire and Police committee to ensure his comments were included. Borough Solicitor Hartman indicated the Sunshine Act is based on a perceived violation, and indicated the concern raised is not a challenge of the Sunshine Act.

PUBLIC HEARING FOR THE BOROUGH OF WYOMISSING ORDINANCE
AMENDMENT (Ordinance 1428-2022):

Borough Solicitor, Chris Hartman called the hearing to order at 7:02 p.m. by providing an introduction to the process of the hearing, the purpose of the hearing, and the presentation of the proposed Ordinance amendment to the Borough Ordinance. Borough Solicitor Hartman shared that an Ordinance is already in existence for construction and large vehicles based on weights and dimensions. He shared that the proposed Ordinance adds a 48 hour time period of which large vehicles may remain parked for loading and unloading. After 48 hours, vehicles must relocate within one mile of the previous location, of which one mile is measureable by the Police who will be enforcing the Ordinance. This allows the Borough to monitor extend parking of large vehicles.

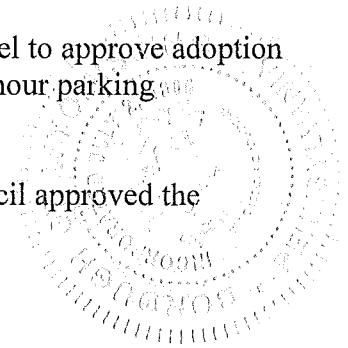
No public comments were provided.

ORDINANCE NO. 1428-2022 -AN ORDINANCE OF THE BOROUGH OF WYOMISSING, BERKS COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA AMENDING THE WYOMISSING BOROUGH CODE OF ORDINANCES TO ESTABLISH ADDITIONAL RESTRICTION ON THE 48 HOUR PARKING ALLOWANCE FOR CERTAIN VEHICLES

Councilmember Stanko made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to approve adoption of Ordinance 1428-2022 as to establishing additional restriction on the 48 hour parking allowance for certain vehicles, all in favor, 6-0.

COUNCIL MINUTES: On motion duly made, seconded and passed, Council approved the minutes of the November 8, 2022 meeting.



CONSULTING ENGINEER'S REPORT: On motion duly made, seconded and passed, Council approved the Consulting Engineer's report dated December 13, 2022.

Due to Borough Engineer Jim McCarthy's absence, there was no further review of the report.

POLICE DEPARTMENT & MAYOR'S REPORT: On motion duly made, seconded and passed, Council approved the Police Department & Mayor's report dated December 13, 2022.

Due to Police Chief John Phillips' absence, there was no further review of the report.

FIRE CHIEF'S REPORT: On motion duly made, seconded and passed, Council approved the Fire Chief's report for November 2022.

Fire Chief Colin Hackman reviewed the report.

RECREATION BOARD: On motion duly made, seconded and passed, Council approved the Recreation Board report dated November 15, 2022.

Recreation Director Peter Beck shared with Council that Lighting of the Greens took place on December 4, 2022 with 350 people in attendance. He also shared that the first Family Movie Night was held at the Wyomissing High School with 32 people in attendance. Additional movie nights will be planned for January, February, and March 2023.

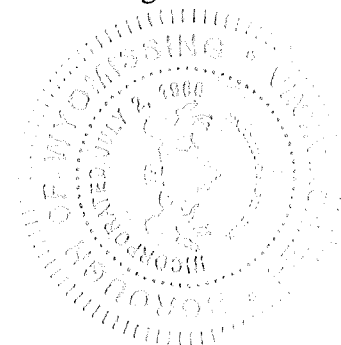
Councilmember Barnett made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Brunner to approve the Memorial Day Parade route change to turn left onto South Hampton Drive instead of the traditional right, eliminating a portion of Downing Drive and Deborah Drive, all in favor, 6-0.

Councilmember Barnett made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Brunner to approve the posting of rule signs at the Wyomissing Hills and Happy Hollow basketball courts to inform the public of the expected behaviors when utilizing either facility, all in favor, 6-0.

ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE: On motion duly made, seconded and passed, Council approved the Economic Development Committee report dated November 17, 2022.

Mayor Levering reviewed the report.

Mayor Levering shared that the committee spoke in length about the proposed Short-Term Rental Ordinance of which will help regulate short-term rentals to ensure safety and combat community disruptions. The Ordinance has since been sent to the Borough's Planning Commission for review and comments.



INFRASTRUCTURE COMMITTEE: On motion duly made, seconded and passed, Council approved the Infrastructure Committee report dated November 21, 2022.

Councilmember Brunner reviewed the report.

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to ratify the prior motion made during the November 21, 2022 Infrastructure Meeting to authorize Borough Manager Michele Bare to prepare a letter to Western Berks Water Authority regarding the stance to continue fluoridation treatments in the water supply, all in favor, 6-0.

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to approve payment of Payment Application No. 4 in the amount of \$126,915.96 to Sewer Specialty Services for the sewer and rehabilitation and televising project, all in favor, roll call vote, 6-0.

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to approve payment of Payment Application No. 2 in the amount of \$28,916, to LB Construction Enterprises, Inc., for 50/50 Sidewalk Work, all in favor, roll call vote, 6-0. This is a reduction in the original amount approved during the November Infrastructure committee meeting due to quantities being less than expected.

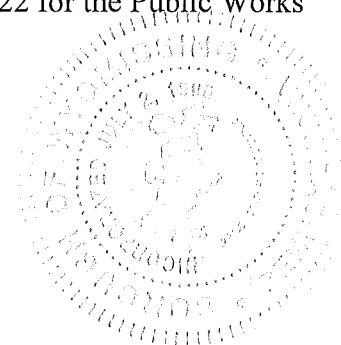
Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to approve payment of Payment Application No. 3 in the amount of \$46,216.45, to LB Construction Enterprises, Inc., for 50/50 Sidewalk Work, all in favor, roll call vote, 6-0.

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Barnett to approve Change Order No. 1 in the amount of \$162,817, to LB Construction Enterprises, Inc., for 50/50 Sidewalk Work, all in favor, 6-0.

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to authorize the Public Works Director to mail curb replacement notices to residents in the area of the 2023 proposed street improvement areas, all in favor, 6-0.

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Reeser to authorize the Smitty's Lawn Care revised mowing rate of \$3,480 per cut, all in favor, 6-0.

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Barnett to accept the RAC-P grant of \$2,000,000 awarded to the Borough on November 18, 2022 for the Public Works facility project, with a 50% grant match obligation, all in favor, 6-0.



LIBRARY BOARD: On motion duly made, seconded and passed, Council approved the Library Board report dated November 21, 2022.

Councilmember Barnett reviewed the report.

Councilmember Barnett indicated that the library is working on updating various policies. She further expressed her gratitude on behalf of the library for the Borough's financial support, and also thanked Borough Manager Michele Bare for sitting with library personnel to explain the budgeting process. She lastly informed Council of the vacancy for the Children's Librarian.

FIRE AND POLICE COMMITTEE: On motion duly made, seconded and passed, Council approved the Fire and Police Committee report dated November 29, 2022.

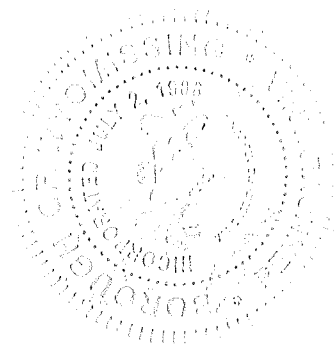
Councilmember Jenckes reviewed the report.

Councilmember Jenckes made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to approve the suggested change to Section 3.8 General Qualifications, of the Fire Department Civil Service rules and regulations, to waive subsection E pertaining to the requirement to have a valid Class B Commercial Driver's License upon hire. All applicants must still possess a valid driver's license and be eligible to legally operate a motor vehicle in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, and will now be given up to 6 months after hire, to obtain a Pennsylvania Class B Commercial Driver's License, contingent upon Class B testing availability within 6 months for new hires to participate in, all in favor, 6-0.

Councilmember Jenckes made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Stanko to approve the execution and submission of the Letter of Intent to DCED to participate in an operational study for the Fire Department, all in favor, 6-0.

Councilmember Jenckes made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Barnett to authorize the sale of Police Car 5 directly to the Wyomissing Area School District, contingent on a mutually agreed upon sale price, all in favor, 6-0.

Councilmember Jenckes made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Brunner to authorize a Firefighter who was injured while working for another employer and who is receiving Workers Compensation through the other employer, the right to use a portion of accrued sick leave to bring the total compensation from Workers Compensation and sick leave to the net compensation received from the Borough based on the Firefighter's base compensation, all in favor, 6-0.



PLANNING COMMISSION: On motion duly made, seconded and passed, Council approved the Planning Commission report dated December 5, 2022.

Councilmember Stanko reviewed the report.

Councilmember Stanko made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to grant conditional plan approval for the Berkshire Mall West Land Development plan, subject to all items in McCarthy Engineering review letter dated November 30, 2022 and TPD's review comments being addressed, as well as either a notation on the plan for the discussed emergency access, or the submission of a letter of authorization to the Borough for the emergency access, all in favor, 6-0.

Councilmember Stanko made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to approve a fee in-lieu of Traffic Impact Study for Berkshire Mall West, with the appropriate fee agreed upon by Borough personnel, all in favor, 6-0.

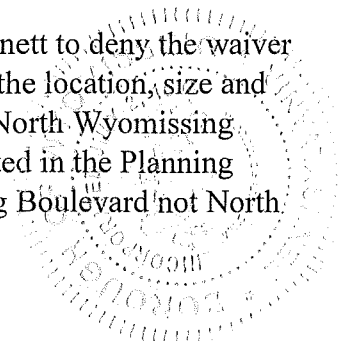
Councilmember Stanko made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to grant the waiver from the formal land development requirements for 301 North Park Road contingent upon comments in McCarthy Engineering's review letter dated November 30, 2022, as well as administrative review of the revised site plan submitted by the property owner, all in favor, 6-0.

Councilmember Stanko made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Barnett to grant the waiver from Section 404.1.H to allow the key map to be presented at a scale of 1" = 300' instead of the required scale of 1" = 800' for 850 North Wyomissing Boulevard, all in favor, 6-0. Council amended the initial motion as indicated in the Planning Commission report to reflect the correct street name of North Wyomissing Boulevard not North Wyomissing Boulevard.

Councilmember Stanko made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to grant the waiver from Section 403.1 and 404.1 from the Subdivision and Land Development Ordinance regarding plan scale for 850 North Wyomissing Boulevard, all in favor, 6-0. Council amended the initial motion as indicated in the Planning Commission report to reflect the correct street name of North Wyomissing Boulevard not North Wyomissing Hills Boulevard.

Councilmember Stanko made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to deny the waiver from Section 404.1.L, to field locate and show on the plans all utility lines currently serving the current building for 850 North Wyomissing Boulevard, all in favor, 6-0. Council amended the initial motion as indicated in the Planning Commission report to reflect the correct street name of North Wyomissing Boulevard not North Wyomissing Hills Boulevard.

Councilmember Stanko made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Barnett to deny the waiver from Section 404.1.W and 404.1.X, to field locate and show on the plans the location, size and material of all underground utilities and associated rights of way for 850 North Wyomissing Boulevard, all in favor, 6-0. Council amended the initial motion as indicated in the Planning Commission report to reflect the correct street name of North Wyomissing Boulevard not North



Wyomissing Hills Boulevard.

FINANCE & ADMINISTRATION COMMITTEE: On motion duly made, seconded and passed, Council approved the Finance and Administration Committee report dated December 8, 2022.

Due to Councilmember Derr's absence, Councilmember Brunner reviewed the report.

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Reeser to approve disbursement of the fourth quarter MMO to the pension plans in the amount of \$74,499.50, as well as additional pension plan funding of \$100,000, for a total payment of \$174,499.50 to be made to the pension plans, all in favor, roll call vote, 6-0.

RESOLUTION NO. 2022-24- A RESOLUTION OF THE BOROUGH COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF WYOMISSING, BERKS COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA, APPOINTING HERBEIN + COMPANY, INC. AS INDEPENDENT AUDITOR OF THE BOROUGH OF WYOMISSING

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to adopt Resolution No. 2022-24 as to appointing Herbein + Company, Inc as the independent auditor for 2023, all in favor, 6-0.

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to approve the Herbein +Company, Inc audit fee of \$17,000, all in favor, roll call vote, 6-0.

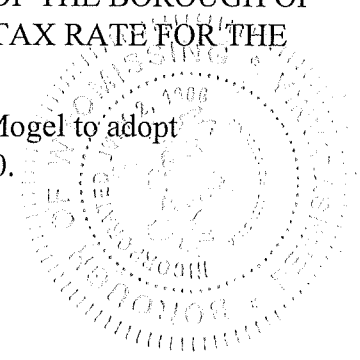
Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Stanko to adopt Resolution No. 2022-25 as to setting new water rates effective January 1, 2023, all in favor, 6-0.

RESOLUTION NO. 2022-26- A RESOLUTION OF THE BOROUGH OF WYOMISSING ESTABLISHING STANDARD METERED RATES FOR DOMESTIC AND INDUSTRIAL SEWAGE

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Barnett to adopt Resolution No. 2022-26 as to setting new sewer rates effective January 1, 2023, all in favor, 6-0.

RESOLUTION NO. 2022-27- A RESOLUTION OF THE COUNCIL OF THE BOROUGH OF WYOMISSING, BERKS COUNTY, PENNSYLVANIA FIXING THE TAX RATE FOR THE YEAR 2023

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to adopt Resolution No. 2022-27 as to fixing the tax rate for 2023, all in favor, 6-0.



RESOLUTION NO. 2022-28- A RESOLUTION OF THE BOROUGH OF WYOMISSING REVISING AND UPDATING THE BOROUGH'S FEE SCHEDULE

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Reeser to adopt Resolution No. 2022-28 as to establishing Borough rates for 2023, all in favor, 6-0.

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to approve advertisement of the 2023 meeting dates, all in favor, 6-0.

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Reeser to approve updating the delinquent utility account notification procedure to eliminate one mailed notice, thus mailing one past due notice as well as the second/final notice, with the shut-off notice being hand-delivered to the residence, all in favor, 6-0.

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to approve the advertised 2023 budget, all in favor, 6-0.

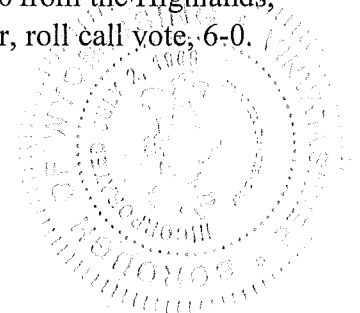
Councilmember Brunner thanked all department heads for the efficient budget process this year. Councilmember Jenckes also thanked the Finance and Administration committee for their diligent work on the budget as well.

BOROUGH MANAGER'S REPORT: On motion duly made, seconded and passed, Council approved the Borough Manager's report dated December 13, 2022.

Borough Manager Bare shared with Council that the minutes from the November 14, 2022 Western Berks Water Authority board meeting are in the Council packet for review, as well as the 2023 Wyomissing Valley Joint Municipal Authority budget, and the letter sent by Senator Schwank to the Western Berks Water Authority regrading water fluoridation.

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to approve the sale on Muncibid of the 2018 Ford Police Interceptor at a purchase price of \$9,300 and a 2002 Ford Crown Victoria at a purchase price of \$2,550, all in favor, roll call vote, 6-0.

Councilmember Mogel made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Barnett to authorize execution of an agreement between Wyomissing Borough, Spring Township and the Highlands, for connections to be made from The Highlands to the West Lawn Interceptor as part of The Highlands Apartment Project and for payment to the Borough of \$300,000 from the Highlands, contingent upon review and comments from Spring Township, all in favor, roll call vote, 6-0.

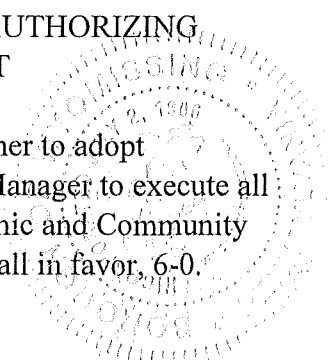

Council President Jenckes thanked Borough Treasurer Gregory Portner for his years of service to the Borough.

Councilmember Brunner made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Reeser to approve advertisement of Ordinance No. 1429- 2023, to amend Chapter 18, “Sewage and Sewage Disposal”, to remove reference to specific rate amounts and instead reference rates imposed by the Wyomissing Valley Joint Municipal Authority and rates adopted by resolution by the Borough of Wyomissing, all in favor, 6-0.

Borough Manager Bare lastly reminded Council that Borough Hall will be closed on December 23 and 26, 2022 as well as January 2, 2023 in observance of the holidays.

TREASURER’S STATEMENT OF OPERATIONS: On motion duly made, seconded and passed, Council approved the Treasurer’s Statement of Operation and all financial statements.

Treasurer Gregory Portner reviewed the report noting that the 2023 proposed year-end fund balance is expected to be the fund balance that was originally proposed for year-end 2022. He commended Borough staff and the Finance and Administration committee for their diligence with balancing expenses and revenues throughout 2022.

ACCOUNTS PAYABLE: Councilmember Jenckes made a motion, seconded by Councilmember Mogel to approve the Accounts Payables report for December 2022, all in favor, roll call vote, 6-0.

TAX COLLECTOR'S REPORT: On motion duly made, seconded and passed, Council approved the Tax Collector's report for the Month of November 2022.

Due to the Tax Collector's absence, there was no further review of the report.

NEW BUSINESS:

No new business to discuss.

PUBLIC COMMENT (non-agenda items):

State Representative Elect for the 129 District, Johanny Cepeda- Freytiz, introduced herself and indicated she is available to assist with the needs of the Borough.

Adrian Jadic, 48 Cardinal Road congratulated and thanked Ms. Cepeda- Freytiz for newly elected position. He further petitioned Council to treat all residents with the same respect, and to stop interrupting the public and lying to them. He feels Council does not care about the comments raised by the public, and further is concerned that cultural racism and discrimination is occurring. He provided the example of the public comment provided at the Fire and Police committee meeting, reiterating his feeling that the report should have been coded as criminal trespassing, as other blotter reports contain specific incident titles. He was upset by how the report was explained to him, and was more upset that the Police should have known that the resident of 41 Cardinal Road was petitioning the DA for charges to be filed. He is still concerned that actions of the residents of 47 Cardinal Road are being protected and covered by the Police. His public comments are attached to the meeting minutes.


